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I'N T R O D U C T I O N

On Monday 31st. March 1969, the writer landed at Freeport's International Airport where he was met by Commissioner K. P. Spencer who on the following day began a pre-arranged tour of the High Rock District saying goodbye to his friends whilst the writer ventured out in forming fresh acquaintances in a strange land.

On Friday 4th April 1969, just before closing time R. J. McPhee/District Commissioner officially took over as head of the administration of Government of the High Rock District.

During the greater part of the year, the Commissioner who resides at High Rock, was aided in various phases of local administration by the lone Justice of the Peace at Sweetings Cay, two Local Gonstables, two Local Boards of works, one of fice clerk and eight district constables.

Law and order were satisfactorily maintained throughout the District during the year.

GEOGRAPHICAL LAYOUT:

The High Rock District stretches a distance of thirty seven miles on the Eastern tip of Grand Bahama lying precisely between 26 to 27 degrees North Latitude and 77.5 to 78.5 degrees West Longitude. This district is typical of most other out island Districts lined with beautiful cays and intricate sounds, and to its eastern tip it is considered one of the most scenic areas of the Bahamian Archipelago.

The entire island of Grand Bahama is very flat with its highest elevation found in the High Rock District, and suffice it to say that it is from this source that the settlement of High Rock thus the District of High Rock received its name.

There are several small boot harbours in the District, but no safe shelter due to the many shallow reefs and banks running almost parallel to the coast line.

The latest Census figures totalling 1520 in population are scattered in the Communities from Freetown to the West to Sweetings Cay in the East.

Due to the proximity of the entire island to the North West Providence Channel, it is very common to experience much unpleasant and cold weather during the period from November to February when the temperature drops to a very low 47° Fahrenheit For the year under review, the maximum temperature recorded was 93°F and a minimum 47°.

TOURISM:

The tourist industry in the High Rock District has improved tremendously over the period under review - this of course mostly on week-ends when many outsiders chose to sail or fly in at Deep Water Cay and Sweetings Cay north for a rather quiet moment rather than remaining in Freeport where the environment differs.

Tourist accommodation can be readily had at the two Centres above and presently discussions are now a-foot to improve the situation tremendously over the next year.

Generally, the High Rock District made strides and improvements during the year under review, despite existing road conditions in the area; however, it is most pleasing to note that work has commenced on the main road connecting High Rock with Freeport and it is expected soon that emphasis will be placed on the road between Pelican Point and McLeans Town.

On behalf of the inhabitants of the High Rock District, the writer wishes to express his sincere thanks and appreciation to Government for the various sums of money allocated and appropriated for Public Works during the year.

He submits humble apologies for any short comings in this report, and sincerely hope that it conveys to Government a crystal ball view of the conditions during 1969.

Population:

The last official Census figures in the district showed the distribution of population as follows:

Due to the fast growth of Freeport, a good many of the former residents of this District migrated thereto.

During the year under review, a total of 22 births and 3 deaths were recorded.

Momentarily, Government is considering an update Census of Population - Census date April 7th. 1970 and it is quite likely, by virture of the continuous migration to Freeport as well as other islands of the Bahamas, compared with the birth rate and other new comers the new Census figure could be much the same.

Public Works & Utilities

(a) Public Works.

During the year all Public Works were carried out under the supervision of the District Commissioner, Ministry of Works Representatives in Freeport and the two Local Board of Works in High Rock and Sweetings Cay.

The above projects were those for which funds were specially allocated from the various Ministries - mostly Ministry of Works.

Not to mention the many and various other jobs throughout the District, all public yards, building and roads were either monthly or quarterly maintained during the year under review.

Under the term of "General Upkeep" for the entire District, a total of four thousand one hundred dollars paid for the minor jobs here and there not listed.

ROADS

In the High Rock District there is approximately 30 miles of Public road stretching from Free Town to McLeans Town. About 21 miles of this road is asphalted and partially maintained by the United Air Force Missile Base.

XERO

During the year under review the condition of the road had degraded to such a state that on recommendations to Ministry of Works in Freeport, Four thousand two hundred dollars were spent in an effort to keep the whole area from falling through.

PARKS & RECREATION GROUNDS

There are no parks or recreation grounds in the District; but plans are presently afoot to construct several playfields through the area.

These are likely to be constructed when funds are available, near the existing School-Grounds.

GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS

As shown in the previous table, there are twenty seven Government buildings throughout the District. At the end of the year under review, these were all in good shape, having had minor repairs and paintings done to several of them.

WHARVES

There are two docks in the district, one at Sweetings Cay and the other at McLeans Town. Both considered to be small, are extensively used by fishing boats and visiting yachts to the Eastern end of the island.

KERO

Minor repairs were put in hand to upkeep these structures which are so important to the livelihood of many inhabitants in this area.

(b) PUBLIC UTILITIES

Water

* Public and private wells are the main sources of water supplies in High Rock District.

During the year several pumps were installed in an effort to minimize contamination of this supply.

In the settlements of Sweetings Cay and McLeans Town, fresh water is a bit scarce. It is the intention of Government to set up a pipe - water system in these areas shortly.

Electricity

Though for some time there had been some talk on this heading, no city current has been installed but, in all settlements there are a number of privately owned generators. Most of the Government cottages are supplied with electricity from generators.

Garbage Collection

This subject had for some time been a thorn in the Government Administration here due to its late implementation.

It is supervised by the Board of Works under the direct guidance of the Commissioner, whose responsibility it is through Government, for making payments.

As far as is possible drums are supplied to each householderthese are placed by the road side, filled from day to day with garbage and -collected weekly by a truck.

The system is presently under control and suffice it to say that this was much long over due in a growing District as this one.

CHAPTER 111

GOMMUNICATIONS ...

There is no Port of Entry in the High Rock District.

Foreign wessels do onter occasionelly at the Gold Rock Greek

harbour where it is processed and entered by a Customs officer

who travels from Freeport.

The mailboat services to the District were satisfactorily performed by the M. V. Noel Roberts and the M. V. Captain Dean.

Daily mail service between the East End of Grand Bahama and Nassau Via Freeport was efficiently manned with Local Const. Stanford Laing performing the duty as mail carrier.

The Branch of the Post Office here at High Rock efficiently manned by Postal Clerk Eula Rolle, also played its part in serving well the residents of East End Grand Bahama.

With the office also catering to all postal financial transaction, it serves as a nucleus for daily business as such.

TELEPHONE & TELEGRAPH

There is one Radio telephone station in the High Rock District . centred at the settlement of High Rock and provides ready telephone communication between Grand Bahama and the outside world.

A Telegraph station is set up at Sweetings Cay, virtually the distance of approximately 30 miles from Headquarters and serves that community or settlement only by telegraph messages.

The majority of the inhabitants possess radios and display keen interest in programmes over the Local station ZNS as well as stations in the U.S.A.

CHAPTER 1V

JUSTICE, POLICE & PRISON SERVICES

Law and order were satisfactorily maintained in the High Rock District during the year 1969.

A total of 58 cases were tried summarily in the District Magistrate's Court during the year. Of these 39 were criminals 16 were traffic and 3 were civil cases.

There is no organized fire service in the High Rock District but in the event of a fire, apart from the community help, assistance can always be received from the U.S. Missile Base where there is a U.S. Governmet fire station.

If and when the situation warrants additional help, the Freeport Fire station is summoned to the call.

1. STAFF CHANGES:

Mr. Charles Farrington headteacher for three years and a half of McLeans Town School, was transferred to Burnt Rock, Andros. He was succeeded at McLeans Town by Mr. Clarence Wiggins who formerly headed the primary school at Behring Point Andros.

Mr. Charles Farrington's last days at McLeans Town were marked by bitter disputes with members of the local community.

Among subordinate staff, were the usual resignations brought about when staff members found more lucrative employment in private enterprises.

2. STAFF:

The difficulties experienced in securing suitable living accommodation has in the past limited the numbers of Trained experienced Teachers that could be posted in the district. With the construction of additional Ministry of Education Cottages in the district more trained teachers may be posted to schools in the district.

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3. CHANGES IN ORGANIZATION

Grand Bahama was organized as an educational district and separated from the West Bahamas District which has headquarters in Fresh Creek, Andros. Headquarters for the newly organized district of Grand Bahama was set up in Freeport. This arrangement should allow for closer supervision and readier solution to local problems. Mr. Harold Poitier, District Education Officer took up duties in Freeport on July 2nd 1969.

4. FURTHER TRAINING:

One member of staff, MR. Everette Archer, was admitted to the Teachers Training College Nassau, where he is following the Two-Year Course.

5. PUPILS

There has been a noticable drift back to their home town schools of pupils who had some time in the past gone off to Freeport where they obtained places at Hawksbill School.

Some pupils go off to Freeport High or Catholic High with the hope of improving their academic standards.

The students are all faced with the difficulty of securing suitable and adequate living accommodations with relatives_others with concerned friends.

Some students prefer to commute to Freeport from their home settlements.

6. FURTHER DEVELOPMENT:

There is urgent need for additional class-room space at Sweetings Cay and McLeans Town.

At Sweetings Cay the older pupils are accommodated in two very small rooms, rooms which originally were used as store room, library and headteacher's office.

It is hoped that in the near future adequate additional. class-rooms will be provided at both Sweetings Cay and McLeans. Town.

7. SCHOLARSHIPS AND EXAMINATIONS:

Thomas Franklyn of Pelican Point School, successfully wrote the Common Entrance Examinations and obtained a place at St. Augustine College _ 16 students from High Rock school were successful in, at least one subject in the B. J. C. Examinations.

8. NEW BUILDING:

At the new Freetown village the school is conducted in a building which also serves as society hall and church meeting place. The present arrangement for the joint use of this building will continue until the construction of the New Freetown Primary School. This school is to be built on a three acre site donated by Mr. Wallace Groves who also gave a generous gift of \$75,000 which is to cover the cost of a new school and teacher's cottage.

9. MUSIC FESTIVAL:

In the annual Music Festival competition High Rock School entered and again as in former years gave a good account of itself. In thier continuing effort to improve their standards this school successfully accumulated sufficient funds for the purchase of a piano. The Ministry of Education encouraged the effort by making a contribution equal to 50% of the value of the piano.

10. SPORTS:

In the annual Grand Bahama School Sports meet the school which enter the competition recorded satisfactory results.

In school Wolley Ball Competition, High Rock School retained the Island Championship.

FRATERNAL ORGANIZATIONS:

Fraternal Organizations in the District consist of five burial societies and one Elk Lodge. Many of the inhabitants are members of the Masonic and Eastern Star Temple in the Freeport and Eight Mile Rock area.

Serving the spiritual needs of the people of High Rock District, in each settlement there are churches of either one of the following denominations: Anglican, Baptist or Church of God (Pentecostal).

MEDICAL SERVICES:

There is one clinic in the entire District. This clinic situate in McLeans Town with a resident nurse, feeds out-locally for medicare to the residents of Sweetings Cay and McLeans Town.

Dr. John Clement, medical officer (Government) for the Grand Bahama District makes periodic visits to the East End, conducting clinic at Freetown and High Rock on the same day and at Pelican Point and McLeans Town on other days.

Suffice it to say that this community is in dire need of a resident nurse; but with no accommodation available, the situation seem likely to remain unchanged.

In general 1969 was a good year for health in the High Rock District and conditions are improving and should continue so to do in the years lying ahead.

SOCIAL SECURITY:

During the year under review a total of \$10,608 was paid to the aged persons in the district as pension under the Old Age Pension Act.

At the end of the year under review there were 68 persons list as pensioners as compared to 69 previously.

HOUSING & TOWN PLANNING

CHAPTER VI

CURRENCY & BANKING

There are not banks in the High Rock District but due to the daily fransport service between Freeport and this area, most inhabitants take advantage of the many banks and other financial instutions in the Freeport area.

The District Post Office Savings Bank, situated in the Commissioner's Office Building at High Rock provides most valuable for the residents of East End, Grand Bahama.

The total deposits during the year under review amounted to \$2,225.00 while withdrawal amounted to \$2,032.00.

CHAPTER VII

COMMERCE

Although there is no port of entry in the High Rock District, much trade import - export is carried on by residents locally through the Freeport area.

With several local stores in the district the following are imported either through agents in Freeport or directly from the U. S. A. and the U. K.:-

Foodstuffs, footwear, household effects, clothing, liquor tobacco moter-vehicles etc.

Even in the Building Industry a few of the Local Contractors import most of their own building materials, as it is often considered generally to be more reasonable in this manner.

Exports included crawfish, scale fish and conchs.

Catching and exporting the crawfish deserves special mention for it has been proven during the year under review, that although the season for the catch lasts only six months approximately, the fishermen receive tremendous financial benefits therefrom.

PRODUCTION:

(e) Fishing

Alighes are plentiful in the waters eround the district and Lucrative employment locally.

(b): Agriculture

A small group of the inhabitants of the district till the soil and the little peas, corn or other farm produce grown, suffices only local consumption.

The land in the entire district is of course arable, and it is saddening to report that though some of the residents seemed vigorous to do a little farming, there is no response from request for even financial assistance in getting started on farming commercially.

(c) Stock & Poultry

There is little evidence of live stock in this District; but with poultry farm just outside the area, midway to Freeport some of the local residents take special advantages in travelling by car and obtaining fresh supplies of eggs and chickens almost daily.

Under the foregoing circumstances the less fortunate - those who are unable to travel by cars, are thus able to make purchases at reasonable rates.

GENERAL, REMARKS

Looking back over the accomplishments for the year under review, it may well serve to conclude that the year was a most prosperous one:
